SOCIAL SKILLS Farrington Gurney pupils aim to:

work and socialise with pupils from different religious, ethnic and socioeconomic backgrounds by supporting foodbanks, others in need and participating in events with a wide range of other schools.

Farrington Gurney pupils aim to:

- 1. recognise the difference between right and wrong and readily apply this to their own lives by having a clear understanding of the school's Golden Rules/ACE Learners.
- 2. understand the consequences of their actions by accepting positive praise and sanctions and by understanding they are responsible for their actions.
- 3. investigate, and talk about, moral and ethical issues that are meaningful and relevant to them by keeping abreast of local, national and international events, and being given the opportunity to explore their own views (MAT debating competition for example).

- use their imagination and creativity in their learning by engaging in open ended tasks in class, by choosing their language features during Write Stuff lessons.
- 4. willingly reflect on their experiences by following the Zones of Regulation, carrying out reflective activities during PSHE and RE lessons, by participating in reflective opportunities during collective worship leading children to develop the skills of being reflective and open-minded individuals.
