Sports News

Somerset Cricket Club - Girls' Participating Initiative

If you have not received a report, please firstly check your spam folder and your child's Buckler's Mead Academy email account, before contacting your child's Maths teacher. The reports are generated by collecting information from recent assessments and are a great resource showing your child's strengths (highlighted in green) and weaknesses (highlighted in red).

The red links will take you to a webpage specifically designed to help your child develop their Mathematics by working on the topic they have found challenging. All pages have notes about the topic and links to CorbettMaths Videos and worksheets (scroll down to the bottom of the page). Most have a video from the Midsomer Norton Schools Partnership. If your child's report has a grey coloured tile that signifies a topic that has not been assessed recently.

Festival of a Song - Layton Year 8



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
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What's been happening in Art this term?
