Head Teacher News

Spring Term

Students are enjoying the opportunity to be out and about more in the community, now that the weather is getting better. Recently we have had groups of students visiting Nunney Castle, local shops, The Shed and Frome Hospital to name a few.

We have also had a big focus this term on developing our play skills and developing our knowledge of the 'Be Safe'strand of the Critchill Code. We have introduced some new playground equipment to support these sessions and staff and students are looking forward to this equipment making a daily appearance after half term.

I am pleased to share that we have had some very positive feedback from other Headteachers from our Somerset SEN Partnership Schools (SEN.SE.) They came and did a visit to see how Mathematics is taught and fed back to staff.

Some highlights of their report include; "Clear progression of learning within the books. Lots of photographs to illustrate learning" "Stand out teaching we saw was on Algorithms with a Narnia curriculum link, IT, Maths and Literacy." "You can see student and staff pride." "Teachers know their children well".

It is with pride that I can share such positive feedback that encompasses the commitment and hard work that Students access and all staff at Critchill deliver on a daily basis.

To add to this the Governors of Critchill School, carried out a learning walk on Tuesday 30th January and also shared very positive feedback which you will see included later in this newsletter.

As many of you know Dolly the Dog, retired from her position as school dog earlier this year and is enjoying retirement, gentle walks and lots of rest! The school will now be joined by Buddy, who is also, like Dolly, owned by our Executive Head Teacher, Sophie Addison. Buddy is a Dachshund and a much loved family pet. 

"Also of note is how potentially difficult situations /disputes between pupils were dealt with calmly and promptly by staff with minimal potential for escalation or disruption for others."



Sue"We were able to see examples of some of the pupils' workbooks and I was impressed by the levels of learning being achieved. It is good to see the potential that these young people have and that they are receiving the support, encouragement and guidance to help them realise their full capabilities."" It was explained that the school does not operate with "key workers" for each child as it is considered important that individual pupils do not become too reliant upon one member of staff. It was however noted that 1 to 1 support is given where needed."
