### Headteacher's Address

Dear Parents and Carers,

Well, here we are in April and about to embark on the Easter holidays. Spring is in the air, the warmer weather is showing its face (occasionally!) and there are only two terms left in the school year. Whilst the dreaded Covid is officially over, it has still been having a significant impact on schools; I would like to thank you all for your support and understanding during the last term. I would also like to publicly thank all of our staff for the commitment and dedication they have shown in keeping the school open and running as normally as possible. I do hope that next term brings a reduction in the disruption to all our lives.

Once again, I have enjoyed celebrating success with students through 'milkshake at break' – it is great to see students being nominated for living our TRAK values and for being generally lovely human beings! I have also enjoyed seeing Year 10 drama students perform their first live piece to an audience – more of that later in the newsletter. I have been delighted by the positive attitude to sporting events and I was very proud of the students who took part in the International Maths Challenge at Millfield. Well done to all of you.

We say goodbye to Ms Stead and Ms Howell at the end of this term. Thank you to both of them for their hard work and contribution to the school. I wish them every success and happiness for the future.

I was very pleased that we were able to host assemblies and workshops on the campaign to end violence towards women and girls; this is such an important campaign for society and it makes me proud that our students will be at the forefront of ensuring the message is clear in our school and beyond. Thank you to Mr Oakwood for all his work in organising such a powerful day for our students. I am looking forward to seeing the media piece created by the students.

We are now approaching the 'last leg' of Year 11's time with us. It was wonderful to see parents and students for an information evening in the final week of this term; the feedback was that the session was very useful in terms of how to support your child in revising as well as in providing strategies for managing any stress around the exams. Mr Atkinson will be making a recording of the main presentation which wil be sent to parents who could not attend. As you will see later in this newsletter, there are a range of revision courses running in the holidays and I would urge Year 11 students to attend as many as possible as well as those being run after school during term time. Moving into next term, I am pleased to say that we will be removing some of the plastic drinks bottles from the canteen as we try to reduce our single use plastic around the school. There will be cartons of juice available from the canteen and we will still have bottles of water while we research the best options for more environmentally friendly containers. All students should have a resuable drinks bottle so that they can fill it at the water cooler.

As we look forward to the rest of the school year and, hopefully, a return to more normality, we need to ensure that students are in the correct uniform and that attendance is as good as possible; we do appreciate it has been incredibly difficult over the last couple of years — and we have made adjustments to our attendance procedures as a result - but considering how much vital learning has been lost already as a result of the pandemic, we now need to ensure that students are in school as much as possible so that they can catch up on any missed work. The new guidance around Covid and children attending school has been shared in a letter from our CEO, Mr Williams.

#### In a nutshell:

- Regular asymptomatic testing is no longer recommended in any education or childcare setting, including
  in SEND and alternative provision. Therefore, our schools will no longer be able to order test kits and we
  are no longer able to hand out any test kits to staff or pupils, unless advised otherwise by our local health
  protection team, local authority or director of public health.
- Children and young people who are unwell and have a high temperature should stay at home and avoid contact with other people. They can go back to school, college or childcare when they no longer have a high temperature, and they are well enough to attend.
- If your child has a positive COVID-19 test result, they should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for 3 days. They can go back to school, college or childcare when they no longer have a high temperature, and they are well enough to attend.
  In essence, these changes enable you to now send your child to school when they are well enough to attend and our school's attendance team will work with parents accordingly.
  Please ensure that your child is in the correct uniform next term so that we can all enjoy the positives of being a part of the St Dunstan's community.

Punctuality is as important as attendance; please note that students should be in their tutor rooms at 8.50 – not arriving on site at that time. All students are expected to be on site by 8.45 at the very latest. We have seen a real improvement in punctuality to school; please continue to support your child to be here promptly so that they have a positive start to the day.

At the end of this term, we say goodbye to Ms Howell who has been offered a new opportunity; we thank her for all her hard work and wish her every success in her new venture.



# Campaign to End Violence Towards Women and Girls

On Wednesday 6th April, we were lucky to have Collaborative Digital come in for the day and work with students about how we as a society can end violence towards women and girls.

Whole year group assemblies were delivered to years 9, 10 and 11, and 18 selected students took part in an intensive three hour workshop. This involved learning and exploring about the issues and evidence regarding this campaign, working with the Collaborative Digital workers to brainstorm ideas and engage in creative writing to prepare podcasts. These podcasts were then recorded with a professional producer and will be edited and sent back to the school to inspire future generations of students.



The students that worked on the project were an absolute credit to the school, as were all the students present in the thought provoking assemblies. By working together, and tackling this issue head on, St Dunstan's students hope to have a positive influence in eradicating violence towards women and girls from society for good. All students in years 9, 10 and 11 were issued with bookmarks containing contact details of support services, and charity wristbands to show their support for the campaign.


## **English**

#### A New Year 7 Text: Lark




This year, as part of our KS3 curriculum overhaul, we decided to include *Lark* by Anthony McGowan as part of the Year 7 scheme of learning and we are pleased to say that the response has been very positive across the year group.

The story follows brothers Nicky and Kenny as they set off for a walk across the Yorkshire moors with their Jack Russell terrier, Tina. But, what starts out as a 'lark', soon begins to go wrong as both snow and darkness descend. When things really take a turn for the worse, the brothers have to work together to make sure they can make it safely home...

As well as being an exciting adventure story, *Lark* also includes themes of family and caring, storytelling and nature, which links in with last term's unit of work on Nature Poetry. There have been a wide range of interesting discussions provoked by the book and maybe even a tear or two!

Lark is also the last book in a quartet and it's been wonderful to see several students picking up the other books in the series to read in their own time - well done Year 7!



March 2nd saw the whole school engage in a range of events to do with books and their impact on our lives. In a world where things are changing so quickly, books have remained constant and comforting. This year's theme was 'You Are a Reader' and students were invited to dress as their favourite character and engage in a number of activities such as designing a bookmark and 'Who's that Behind the Book?' quiz where staff were hiding behind their favourite text.



## <u>R:pple'</u> - The internet can be a force for tremendous good or harm. Here is one tool that attempts to tip the scales in favour of the positive.


While Christmas is a cheerful time for many of us, it is a sad fact that over the last two years internet searches for suicidal thoughts have increased by 23%, searches for suicide methods have increased by 50% and searches for suicide hotlines have increased by 125% (Semrush: 2021).

We have seen this increase within our own student body too, and whilst this is still a tiny minority, 1 student feeling this way is too many. What is sadder still, is that - often when young people search these key phrases online - they often come across any number of websites that are actually harmful, and in some cases explore how these thoughts can be acted on.

'R;pple' is an online interceptive tool designed to ensure more help and support is provided to individuals who are conducting searches relating to self-injury or suicide.


If a young person searches for something related to self-injury or suicide, R;pple intercepts the search, provides an immediate, vibrant display on a user's device, consisting of a message of hope as well as a selection of mental health resources in a range of different communicative options from free, established and 24/7 charity services.

Through R;pple, an individual feeling despair and researching harmful content will be urged to instead seek the mental health support they deserve and need in a way that works best for them.



Further tips on e-safety for parents from CEOP

- 1. Make sure your child knows where to go for support: Remind them they can always speak to you or an adult they trust if anything happens online that makes them feel worried or upset. For a breakdown of report services, visit: Supporting your child with reporting unwanted content online
- 2. Make sure they know about CEOP: Young people can report a concern about grooming or sexual abuse to CEOP at <a href="https://www.ceop.police.uk/safety-centre/">https://www.ceop.police.uk/safety-centre/</a> and get support from a specialist Child Protection Advisor.
- 3. Have an ongoing conversation: Continue to talk about the apps, games and sites they like to use, and what they like and don't like and any concerns about being online. Discuss with them when to unfollow, block or report. For help starting this conversation, read having a conversation with your child.


