Headteacher's Address

Dear Parents and Carers,

Well, here we are at the end of another school year! It has been a very good year with lots of activities and opportunities provided for students as we emerge from the pandemic conditions. As ever, I have been very proud of the efforts and achievements of our students – it was a pleasure to attend the Anne Frank Somerset Youth Awards in Wells Cathedral earlier in the year and see so many of our students achieving recognition for their creative writing. Particular congratulations to Heidi Davis who took first place in the Key Stage 4 category. Likewise, it was wonderful to hear about the success of so many of our students in the maths challenge – a particular well done to Zeppy Malachy for her achievements in the European competition! We have seen sporting successes, amazing culinary skills, excellent artwork and great participation in events such as the STEM day at Strode and the public speaking day with Talk the Talk where I was delighted that every student showed resilience and did a presentation in spite of their nerves. Well done to all. It was a bittersweet day on 5th July as we held our Year 11 Leavers' assembly and then joined Year 11 for their prom in the evening. We all had a wonderful time at the prom – some fantastic outfits and, as ever, good humour from Year 11. The Loft did us proud with the décor, music and food. We all wish Year 11 the very best and look forward to hearing how they are getting on in their next steps; we have had a great five years with them and will always think of them fondly.

The day after the prom, we had the pleasure of welcoming our new Year 7 students for their transition day; it was a great day and it was lovely to see the enthusiasm of the new students as well as the kindness shown to them by our student helpers. The speeches made by students at the evening event for parents were beatifully written and delivered; they truly embodied the spirit of St Dunstan's – well done to all involved. I was delighted by the quality of applications for student leaders this year – Mr Oakwood and I agreed they were of the very highest standard. Congratulations to all those who have secured a leadership post, particularly to Arthur Reakesmith and Olivia Masters, our new head students, Frankie Derbidge and Ashley Gunton, our deputy head student and Molly Johnson whil will be our senior prefect. I know all our student leaders will be fantastic role models for our students – I am very proud of them all.

As we headed towards activities week, we watched the weather forecast with an impending sense of doom! However, as always, our staff showed their flexibility and creativity in adapting the activities to the conditions so that students could still have a great week. One hundred students went to camp in Bideford and, as you will see later in this newsletter, had a great time!

During the course of this year, the conduct of our students as well as their obvious pride in being members of our community has had a significant impact beyond our gates. We have had many requests from students wishing to transfer from other schools because of the reputation our students are building. As a result, our numbers are continuing to grow and, in September, there will be almost 470 students on roll – quite a change from when I joined the school eight years ago and there were 240 students here with numbers falling. It makes me very proud to know what a good school St Dunstan's is and to know that we are being sought out as the place new students want to be. As our numbers grow, it is even more important that we maintain our high expectations and the ethos that makes this school unlike any other. As you know, our core values are very important to us and this year we have reviewed and revised our values, with the help of a panel of students. Going forward, our values have been amended to TRUTH, RESILIENCE, AMBITION, COMMUNITY and KINDNESS – by living these values, we all stay on TRACK.

You will have had a letter from me outlining expectations for next year – please do note the new start time of the day; **morning registration will be at 8.**45 and so all students need to be **on site by 8.40** at the very latest. We will be using the side gate by the Lucas block as we did in preCovid times.

Please also note that all students are expected to be in the correct uniform every day, this includes shoes. Please ensure your child is in correct uniform so that we can focus on the job of providing high quality teaching and learning rather than sorting out incorrect uniform.

Year 10 News



Maths

Maths Team Challenge (Year 7 and Year 8)

Mr Conway took a group of top Mathematicians from St Dunstan's to Norton Hill as one of nine schools represented at the Midsomer Norton Schools Partnership Team Maths Challenge. Lexi Chapman and Jack Matthews in Year 8, and Alfie Cook in Year 7 represented our school in the competition, working as a team in four rounds: Head to Head, Team Memory, Individual Speed, and Relay.

St Dunstan's got a very good score of 181, right in the mix of a number of schools battling very closely for the top places. Beechen Cliff Boys School from Bath took first place, with only 8 points separating the next five schools, including St Dunstan's. Well done to our team, who not only put in an excellent performance representing the school, but also said they genuinely enjoyed it!

Looking to 2023, the Maths department are aiming to enter a team of four (Year 8s and Year 9s) in the UKMT National Maths Team Challenge which, post-Covid, should be up and running again next year.



UKMT National Intermediate and Junior Maths Challenge Results

The UK Mathematics Trust (UKMT) has run annual Maths Challenges for school age students for many years. The challenges are well recognised by colleges, universities and employers, and achieving a bronze, silver or gold certificate is a mark of a top mathematician in a year group nationally. UKMT certificates can feature on college or university applications.

Our top Year 9, 10 and 11 mathematicians took part in the annual UKMT Intermediate Maths Challenge back in February, and this term received their certificates. At St Dunstan's we had eight students achieve a bronze certificate, and one silver, which is a fantastic set of results.


<u>Year 7</u>

In qualifying for the Junior Kangaroo, Zeppy was one of just over 10,000 students nationally. Zeppy's Kangaroo result was only one mark off the level needed for the top Kangaroo award of "Merit". Whilst a little unlucky not to receive a merit, Zeppy did fantastically well to be in that elite group.


Gardening



Pastoral News

<u>R:pple'</u> - The internet can be a force for tremendous good or harm. Here is one tool that attempts to tip the scales in favour of the positive.


While Christmas is a cheerful time for many of us, it is a sad fact that over the last two years internet searches for suicidal thoughts have increased by 23%, searches for suicide methods have increased by 50% and searches for suicide hotlines have increased by 125% (Semrush: 2021).

We have seen this increase within our own student body too, and whilst this is still a tiny minority, 1 student feeling this way is too many. What is sadder still, is that - often when young people search these key phrases online - they often come across any number of websites that are actually harmful, and in some cases explore how these thoughts can be acted on.

'R;pple' is an online interceptive tool designed to ensure more help and support is provided to individuals who are conducting searches relating to self-injury or suicide.

If a young person searches for something related to self-injury or suicide, R;pple intercepts the search, provides an immediate, vibrant display on a user's device, consisting of a message of hope as well as a selection of mental health resources in a range of different communicative options from free, established and 24/7 charity services.

Through R;pple, an individual feeling despair and researching harmful content will be urged to instead seek the mental health support they deserve and need in a way that works best for them.

- 2. Make sure they know about CEOP: Young people can report a concern about grooming or sexual abuse to CEOP at https://www.ceop.police.uk/safety-centre/ and get support from a specialist Child Protection Advisor.
- 3. Have an ongoing conversation: Continue to talk about the apps, games and sites they like to use, and what they like and don't like and any concerns about being online. Discuss with them when to unfollow, block or report. For help starting this conversation, read having a conversation with your child.


