## Headteacher's Address

This has been another good year for the school in which we have seen numbers grow and ambition soar. As you will see from the items in this newsletter, staff and students have been very busy with a range of activities encompassing practical, artistic, physical and academic endeavours. As I write, we are in the throes of a very successful activities week – more on this later in the newsletter.

Well done to everyone and, as ever, a huge thank you to staff for their willingness to give up their time and go the extra mile for students. This was particularly evident in all the extra sessions run after school and during the holidays to support Year 11 with their revision in the run up to the exams. Well done to Year 11 for attending and for their positive attitude towards their exams – we are looking forward to seeing you on results day – 24<sup>th</sup> August. As Year 11 move on to their next steps, we look forward to welcoming our new Year 7 students. We had a fantastic day with them on July 4<sup>th</sup> – they impressed us with their enthusiasm and willingness to participate. We know they will be great St Dunstan's students and we are looking forward to seeing them in September. 
## **Uniform**




## **Maths**

#### MNSP Multi-Academy Trust Maths Team Challenge (Years 7 and 8)

In term 6, Mr Conway took a group of top Mathematicians from St Dunstan's to Norton Hill, as one of nine schools represented at the Midsomer Norton Schools Partnership Team Maths Challenge. Four Year 7s: Henry W, Jaime C, Fay WR and Lyla-May E, (who all achieved very high scores in the Junior Maths Challenge earlier in the year) represented our school in the competition, doing battle armed only with their Maths skills. They worked as a team in four rounds: Head to Head, Relay, Individual Speed, and Team Memory. St Dunstan's got a very good score of 148. Norton Hill School took first place, with Hayesfield Girls' School and Beechen Cliff in second and third places. Well done to our team, who not only put in a good performance representing the school, but also said they enjoyed it! Mr Conway particularly enjoyed the moment when our St Dunstan's team beat Beechen Cliff (last year's champions) in the Head to Head round!

Looking to 2024, the Maths department are aiming to enter a team of four (Year 8s and Year 9s) in the UKMT National Maths Team Challenge which, after 3 years of not running because of Covid, should hopefully be up and running by the UKMT again next year.


#### **Write Night**

## **Personal Development**


### **Personal Development Overview of the Year**

Alongside our regular clubs and fixtures, as well as our leadership opportunities through the Prefect system and our School Council, plus the teaching to all year groups of Personal Social Health and Economic Education, we have had a busy year with regards to Personal Development. Below is an overview of some of the projects the school has undertaken or been involved with over the course of this year:

### **End Violence Against Women and Girls Campaign**

On the 20th January our Years 9-11 again took part in the "End Violence Against Women and Girls Campaign" run by Collaborative Digital. This involved 240 students receiving an hour-long assembly and workshop, and 12 Year 10 students completing a half-day multi-media workshop. One of our podcasts was once again selected for the South-West of England finals. Another sterling result on this most important of campaigns.





#### **Careers Fair**

On the 23rd of March we took all of our Year 10 students to the Millfield careers fair, where there were representatives from over 40 higher education institutions, employers and overseas organisations. THe Year 10 students loved the event, came away extremely inspired and we are very grateful to Millfield school for extending us the invitation to take part.

### **Somerset Wellbeing Survey**

Over the course of a week in late April, 380 students from Years 7-10 took part in the county wide wellbeing survey that Somerset run once every two years. This is normally only for Years 8 & 10, but we believe this is so important we entered all our students in Years 7-10. The results of this survey, help us ensure we are protecting and supporting our young people, and inform our future policies and practices.



#### **Coronation Drama event**

To help mark the Coronation of King Charles, on the 8th of May, 4 students from Years 8-10 were involved in a drama event run by the city council celebrating the Glastonbury history of Coronation and Royals. The students thoroughly enjoyed the event and the council were extremely grateful and impressed with their participation.



#### Street martial Arts club - funded sessions

On the 11th of May we had a demonstration from the Street Mixed Martial Arts club to help promote ending violence on the streets, and the offer of 10 fully funded places at the club from Somerset county council. The students fully enjoyed their workout, and talk on discipline, and a number of students decided to sign up for the free offer.

### Somerset Wells community intergenerational music project

Starting on the 18th of May, and running until the end of the year, 6 students from Years 9 & 10, took part in a music project to connect with older people suffering from dementia. Below is an extract from an email sent from the organisation:



"We wanted to get in touch to say the most enormous thank you for bringing your amazing students to our Singing for the Brain sessions. It was a joy and privilege to watch them blossom over the course of the time they were with us and seeing the relationships between the young people and our clients develop was incredibly special.

We were continually amazed at their intelligence and self awareness. To realise the value of the face-to-face interactions they were having with people from all different walks of life and to be able to articulate this in the way they did was really remarkable and showed maturity and wisdom beyond their years."

### **Collapsed Timetable Days**

We ran 3 days this year when all students in the school were off timetable and experiencing enrichment activities. The themes and dates of these were as follows, with Year 11 students also always having a link to their Exam focus and studies:

### 25.11.22 Positive Mental Health

This involved a collaboration with the county organisation Mental Health Support Team (MHST), and involved their mental health practitioners delivering bespoke workshops on positive mental health, alongside our in-house training, for all our young people. A vital skill in today's modern world.



### 17.03.23 Overall Positive Wellbeing

This day focussed a lot on physical exercise, self-confidence and diet as huge contributing factors to overall positive wellbeing. Out of school activities were undertaken, as well as welcoming specialist agencies to deliver workshops.





#### 14.06.23 Careers

Our Careers Day saw over a dozen professionals come into school to deliver bespoke workshops to our 7-10 students, allowing them to have meaningful encounters with professionals and employers. Students were give a free choice of 3 speakers to attend in their morning session for this day and excellent feedback was received.

# **Duke of Edinburgh**

#### **BRONZE DofE Award**

On 20th/21st July, a group of 31 students undertook their Bronze expedition as a part of the Duke of Edinburgh Award programme. The programme, designed for anyone aged 14-24, consists of physical, skills, volunteering and expedition elements (with an additional residential section at gold level) which can all be tailored to the individual, allowing them to develop as a person and also express themselves and their interests in many different ways.

The expedition was based on the Quantocks, with students completing a 2 day expedition requiring them to hike for 14km (8.7miles) on the Thursday and around 12km (7.5miles) on the Friday. This was across undulating, challenging terrain in small groups where they put their skills to the test to complete an unaccompanied expedition. They developed map reading skills, compass and navigation skills as well as the ability to cook over an open fire.

Across the two days the students not only completed an impressive distance walking, they also demonstrated many valuable skills: the ability to work together as a team, resilience, confidence, perseverance, and above all how to appreciate the natural environment and its many wonders. All students finished the two days full of smiles and good memories from the expedition, and many of them are now looking forward to the possibility of completing their Silver awards too.

We will be introducing the Bronze Award to next year's Year 9 students during the Autumn term. Mrs Potter and Mrs Manning





