Year 6 Learning

In our art lessons this term, year 6 have been focusing on collage and our focus artist has been Sarah Eisenlohr, who is a well-known collage artist from the USA. Eisenlohr takes her inspiration from the environment and much of her artwork communicates a narrative of how humans are having a negative impact upon the world around them. The children in year 6 have therefore spent some time exploring different global environmental issues to inform their own artwork. Here are some of the end results.



Izzy's collage invites the viewer to question the role of humans in forcing the polar bears to the brink of extinction. Not only are carbon emissions leading to rising temperatures and the loss of the polar bears' habitats, but we are also filling up our oceans with plastic. Izzy has expertly illustrated this narrative by presenting us with fumes from the boat and 'plastic bottle fish.' Furthermore, Izzy has manipulated scale (an oversized camera) to suggest that people care more about getting the 'perfect picture' than the plight of these incredible creatures.

Matilda's collage presents a narrative about the hunting of sharks for their fins, which are used to make shark fin soup. We can also see a shark wearing a nurse's hat; this suggests that sharks are also being hunted for medicinal purposes. We can see that the people in the boat look happy - Matilda invites the viewer to question whether they are aware of the damage they are causing.





Lacey's collage shows a barren landscape. We can see a gardener who is, strangely, tending flowers that are made from plastic bottles. The narrative here is that we can no longer grow plants due to the damage caused. In the foreground, Lacey has presented us with a lonely koala bear, desperately clinging to a piece of deadwood.


Amelie's collage depicts the Australian bushfires. Her narrative suggests that this is the fault of humans (the firefighter is spraying fire rather than water and we see a hand adding more fuel into the fire to help it grow).





Lottie has successfully manipulated scale in her collage. We see a giant clock and people running down a long, long road which stretches out for miles into the horizon. In the sky, we see different planets. Lottie invites the viewer to question whether time is running out...
