



In term 1, our Year 11 students wrote articles as part of their English Language lessons. Below is a sample of some of the best pieces produced by them this term.

Sporting Success Should Not Be Determined By Money or Gender By C.P. (11MGE)

Why do we still live in a society where money determines all - including sporting success? Why are we still in a society where, from birth, men have a massive advantage at gaining that success just because of their gender? Can we not all agree that this isn't fair and we shouldn't be tolerating this any longer?

Money. Money is a massive source of limitations and corruption; and, on an individual level, it can be the number one factor for failure.

Just last week I had the chance to enter a set of trials to be on an England development team. This opportunity was phenomenal; it was the first time that I'd heard of an equivalent to an academy for boys, but for us girls. Despite this being an amazing opportunity, I wasn't able to participate as the trials were too far away, and the cost of fuel would have been too great. However, most of the girls on my team were able to go as their families can afford to drive their children 100 miles weekly to play rugby. Is that really fair? I have the same skill set, knowledge and experience as them, yet, as I don't come from a particularly privileged background, I probably won't have the opportunity to play for the Red Roses again. But they will.

You may believe that the money issue stems from lazy parents who don't work and eat crisps all day; however, that is not the case.

I live with my mum and sister; my mum works incredibly hard, did well in school, and yet she will never have the same money or opportunities as others as she didn't come from a privileged background herself.

My personal experience and that of my family prove how wealth, success and exposure determines personal success and wealth. Money has this knockon effect for the tenagers dreaming of playing for their country.

You may be sitting there thinking that it doesn't affect you. But wouldn't you want your children to have an equal chance at achieving their dreams regardless of money? Wouldn't you want your daughter, niece, sister to get paid fairly for all the time, hardwork and effort she's put in over the years?

Black History Month

October is Black History Month (BHM) and in 11.1 we wrote articles discussing the achievements (or the lack thereof) of BHM - students were invited to consider if we should keep BHM or get rid of it.

What Does Black History Month Have To Do With Me? By S.W. (110BA)

So you're probably thinking... "What does Black History month have to do with me?"

I thought the same at your age, but then I dug a bit deeper into why and how we celebrate black history month and it completely changed my attitude towards it.

As a white person this is a challenging topic to speak about as I - and most of you reading - will never truly understand what it feels like to be discriminated against. We will never truly understand what it feels like to be seen as worse than someone for the colour of our skin, and we will never understand the struggles that we have put people through throughout history.

Now, I know you are probably thinking that it wasn't your fault, but it was our ancestors who caused this. Yet, we are the generation who have to heal the wounds that time hasn't managed to heal by itself. We can do this by teaching and understanding different cultures, and this is the aim of Black history month - to try and bridge the gap between our divided past and our united future.

One quote I particularly like is that of Harriet Tubman who was a major part in the push to abolish slavery and helped free over 70 slaves: "Every great dream begins with a dreamer. Always remember, you have within you the strength, the patience and the passion to reach for the stars, to change the world." It highlights the fact that we can do anything, become anything and change the world. Well, let's take after her and let's change the world for good by understanding that everyone is equal and that we are all peers of each other, then maybe we won't have to need a Black History Month: everyone will be integrated and we won't have to highlight an entire month for black history as it will be apart of our everyday life as much as white history already is.

But the first step starts with you... The actions and consequences of your prejudices and discrimination takes us further away from being united. We must educate the new generations, the children, the future so that they don't grow up with racist ideologies against any human no matter the reason. Then we won't have to have a Pride Month nor a Black History Month, which is what we are striving towards

Should We Celebrate Black History Month? By M.L (110BA)

Should Black History Month be celebrated? Isn't black history world history? While black history is world history, black stories and voices are overshadowed by white. Black History Month focuses on bringing attention to black contributions to history, spotlighting black achievements going beyond slavery and racism. It has allowed us to challenge what we have learned in history lessons, but also to inquire about actual events of the past that are not taught in schools. October invites us to learn about, celebrate, and honour black leaders; what they have fought for and sacrificed and endured in the ongoing fight for racial equality.

I am sure that you are thinking that as a white person, what opinion do I have that holds any significance? I have not experienced life through a black person's eyes, so what right do I have to speak about Black History Month? And you would be correct - I have not experienced racial injustice or prejudice, I have not been discriminated against due to the colour of my skin, I have not had to worry about being paid less than my white peers based on my race. Yet, this is a reality for millions of people worldwide. According to Equality Human Rights, a study concluded on the 15th October 2020 shows that black people who leave school with A-levels typically get paid 14.3 percent less than their white peers. Black History Month highlights both the inequalities and triumphs of black people; why would you want to eradicate it?

However, while Black History Month does apotheosise black history, breathing life back into forgotten lives and stories, it also separates white and black peoples - creating a larger split between humanity. Black history IS history. Black people have always been a part of this country, part of the fabric of the Earth's narrative; so why have we chosen to appoint just one solitary month to discuss it? Black history should be taught in classes throughout the year, not just during October. Although, this does beg the question: is Black History Month really a positive step in the right direction to a more inclusive and diverse future?

As black history is often buried and ignored, perhaps Black History Month is paving the way for a future where black history is taught as world history, not alienated.

Open Evening

Finally, one of our students wrote and delivered a speech to groups of visitors in Open Evening. We feel very proud of the writing and speaking skills all our students develop while they are with us - and this speech is an excellent example of those skills. Needless to say, we are very proud! In case you missed it, here are the words.

Open Evening Speech By T.W. (11EDY)

Hello, my name is T. W. and I'm a student in Year 11 at Somervale. I am currently preparing for my exams and trying to pursue a future in biological sciences in the hopes of becoming a Doctor with the view of taking Chemistry, Biology and PE at A-level.

In order for this to happen, the school provides a safe, accommodating environment in which your children's skills can flourish and develop. This is also down to the friendliness and helpfulness of the staff as well.

Aiding my development through years 7-11, I have been provided with countless opportunities including extracurricular activities, Residential trips with the school but also opportunities such as Duke of Edinburgh as well as Ten Tors when reaching Key Stage 4.

I even had the chance to visit Westminster Abbey in celebration of the Commonwealth due to the English Department which was just one of the opportunities to raise our aspirations provided by Somervale School.

One of the most controversial changes from Year 9 to Year 10 is the step up to GCSE but Somervale School ensures that you easily acclimatise to the new GCSE specification, especially in my options which consist of Physical Education, Spanish, Geography and History.

Even during the height of the coronavirus pandemic, Somervale School's teachers were able to provide a sustainable, efficient method of learning so that students would not fall behind on work using online work and other resources that could be delivered directly to the pupils.

This School also offers a wide range of outdoor education as well as allowing students to be carefully nurtured within classrooms to bring the best out of all students no matter what ability or background we come from.

All of these experiences throughout my past 5 years have allowed me to mature and grow as a person and I couldn't have asked for a better start to my future after leaving the school. There are chances to go on residentials in most years, even starting with one only around 4 months after joining the school.

To conclude what I have to say, I believe that this school has put me on track to shine outside of secondary school and has allowed me to progress further towards my main goal of chasing a degree at one of the top universities in the country.
