St John's Goes Solar!

Anyone passing by the School during the Easter holidays will have noticed a hive of activity around our middle playground... this is because we have had 93 solar panels installed to help us to reduce our electricity costs, and to reduce our impact on the environment - both of which are very important to us as a school.

The installation generates enough energy to charge 850,000 iPhones every year!!

Earth Day Activities

As you will already know from last week's Purple Pages, last Friday we celebrated Earth Day at St. John's. This is a day now recognised all around the world on which people celebrate our wonderful planet and discuss ways in which we can look after it.

At St. John's, each year group focused on a different climate zone, ranging from the tropical regions near the equator in EYFS to the polar regions of the Arctic and Antarctic in the year 3.

The children explored the different threats that different parts of the world are currently facing, but most importantly, they investigated the solutions to these problems and how we can make a huge difference here in Midsomer Norton. For example, year 4 considered various ways in which we can reduce our carbon footprint at home and at school, whilst year 1 investigated the benefits of wind power.

Another important part of our Earth Day activities was the school council's cake sale. The children are delighted to inform you that we raised a whopping £102, meaning that we can now adopt an amur leopard for not just one year ... but for two whole years! Thank you to everyone who got involved and made a contribution. We are extremely grateful and excited about this investment that we can now make in the amur leopard's habitat. This will inevitably help other animals and plants too, therefore reviving biodiversity, which is one of the ways that we can reduce the rate of climate change!

School Council Eco Update

Before the Easter holidays, some members of the school council carried out a spot check to determine which electrical appliances were switched on whilst not in use. This took place during a sunny lunchtime, so most people were outside playing. The school council noticed that many appliances are being left on in classrooms even though they are not being used. This mainly included lights and interactive whiteboards.

To solve this issue, some children have started to label lights and electrical appliances with coloured dots to indicate whether they can be turned off. The children have decided to use a traffic-light system:

- Green dot = turn the appliance off if nobody is using it.
- Amber dot = ask an adult if it is ok to to this appliance off.
- Red dot = this appliance must remain switched, so please do not touch.


So far, the school council have 'dotted' about one third of the school and they will continue with this task when they have time next week.




At home, it would be great if you could talk to your child about our new 'dotting' system and see if they have noticed any of the coloured dots around school yet. Most importantly, you could have a discussion about why it is important to turn off electrical appliances. Not only will it contribute to reducing climate change, but it will also save the school money! Hopefully, the children will start switching off the lights and appliances at home too (if they haven't done so already).

Reading in Year 5

Year 5 are really enjoying their guided reading topic at the moment! To learn more about Mayan culture for our history topic, we are currently reading Rain Player by David Wisniewski. Pupils have learnt fascinating facts about Mayan culture, such as the popular game pok-a-tok, and the importance of agriculture and weather patterns to the Mayan population. They have learnt about how Mayans would explain everyday phenomena, such as changes in weather, as actions created by their gods. We heard some brilliant facts



from our children too, who had seen pok-a-tok taking place in Mexico. They also brought in amazing souvenirs to share with the class, such as Obsidian (used by the Mayans to check whether there was a solar eclipse). We look forward to more excitement to come in our Mayan topic in History, where our pupils will be able to put their newfound knowledge to good use!



We are also delving further into History in our English narrative topic this term. We are reading Rose Blanche, a story of a girl who discovers a concentration camp in the midst of the war and tries to make a stand to help those who were oppressed. Our children have started to develop excellent prose, using pathetic fallacy and dialogue, to recount the tale. We were moved by their heartfelt letters from the perspective of a soldier in war writing home to their loved ones. They are also impressing us with their spectacular summarising skills. It has been a term packed with inspiring historical fiction so far. We look forward to getting lost in mystical forests and performing hilarious poems in the weeks to come!



Learning in Seedlings

At Next Steps our topic is "Here, there and everywhere". We are learning about all different types of transport.

We have attached pens to vehicles to draw on large pieces of paper, watching the marks they make as they travel along.

In maths we have matched numbered parking spaces with vehicles with the same number of spots on them.

But the highlight has definitely been the opportunity to see lorries and a real crane this week!

We watched it lift our old nursery building to make room for the new one. The children were so excited to watch it happening, and the grown ups too!

His commitment and passion for the sport is outstanding and we look forward to watching his skills grow.






Rotakids Penfriend

This week we received our first package of letters from the children in Harare and we have begun writing our own responses, which we're hoping to finish and send off after the Bank Holiday weekends. We cannot wait to update you with more information about how this international relationship develops!

Year 5's Trip to Bristol Gurdwara

The Year 5s had a wonderful day on Tuesday exploring the Gurdwara Sri Guru Singh Sabha Bristol with our host Balbir. Starting the day with a trip to the Langar (a free community kitchen), the children learned all about the importance of equality, kindness and generosity amongst the Sikh community whilst enjoying the drinks and snacks offered. The children discussed surrounding artwork resembling the Golden Temple, based in Amritsar, and significant Gurus, applying all that they have learned in their recent religious studies.

We then travelled upstairs to the prayer hall where we were able to practise bowing to the Guru Granth Sahib (Holy Book) and discuss the ways in which Sikhs respect this sacred text. The children were particularly interested in the way that Sikhs treat this holy book as a living person - providing it with its own room in the Gurdwara. We were also fortunate enough to have been told some sacred narratives and hear our hosts recite some of the Japji Sahib in prayer during this time.

The children asked many questions about Sikh values and their commitment to wearing the 5Ks. They enjoyed seeing the kesh, kangha, kara, kachera, and kirpan in person and impressed the adults when discussing the challenges Sikhs, who commit to wearing each of these items everyday, may face in different contexts.

To finish our day, we spent time in St. George Park sharing what we had taken away from the visit. The year 5s loved picnicking together under the sun as a year group before returning back to school.

The children have enjoyed applying their learning to real life contexts and it has been a genuine pleasure for the teaching staff to see Year 5 engaging so beautifully throughout the day. As always, they represented St. John's beautifully showing respect, curiosity and enthusiasm in every given opportunity. An enormous thank you to parents for providing scarves for this trip!
