	Key Knowledge and Vocabulary
Understanding of the world - geography and science focus	Seasons - Spring Know that there are four seasons - Autumn, Winter, Spring, Summer Know that Spring includes the months of March, April, May Know that Spring is one of four months in a year. It's after winter and before summer. Know that Spring is one of Spring will be on Friday 20th March 2023 Know that the first day of Spring will be on Friday 20th March 2023 Know that in Spring, the Earth's axis is tilted toward the sun, increasing the number of daylight hours and bringing warmer weather. Understand what we mean by daylight hours. Know that many trees, flowers, plants and bulbs begin to grow during Spring. Know that they need water, light, warmth and soil to grow. Know that many animals have babies in early Spring. Know that in Spring the weather usually turns warmer. Know that leaves begin to grow on trees. Know that plants start to develop flowers. Know that young animals such as chicks and lambs are born. Know that young animals such as chicks and lambs are born. Know that a chick is a young bird, especially one which is newly hatched. Know that a lamb is a baby sheep Know that the first spring flowers are typically daffodils, dandelions and tulips. Farms Know that a farm is an area of land used for growing crops or raising animals, usually in order to sell them. Know that farmers have an important job to provide food for us to eat. Know that farmers have an important job to provide food for us to eat. Know that people who work on a farm are called farmers Know that farmers can be men or women. Know that farmers can be men or women. Know that farmers grow food, harvest it when it is ripe and then often sell it to large companies who turn it into flour which is sold in

supermarkets. Some flour is sold to companies who make bread with it.

Know that UK farmers also grow oats, potatoes, vegetables and fruits.

Know that plants grow from seeds or bulbs

Know how to plant seeds and provide them with water regularly.

Know how to closely observe a seed growing into a plant over time.

Know that seeds don't grow unless they have warmth, air, water and soil to grow in.

Know the following vegetables grown in the UK by appearance -

carrots, beetroot, cabbage, onions, leeks, turnips, parsnips, broccoli, cauliflower and courgettes.

Know the following fruits grown in the UK by appearance and their taste - apples, strawberries, pears, cherries, blueberries and plums.

Know that fruits and vegetables are good for you and help you to be **healthy**.

Know that we should eat at least 5 portions of these each day (a portion being defined as a handful)

Know that farmers in England may keep the following animals -

horse, rabbit, goat, cow, sheep, duck, goose, hen, pig, donkey, bull/cow, turkey.

Know that farmers keep animals in order to produce the following -

- Meat from cows, sheep, chickens, turkeys and pigs
- Eggs from ducks and geese
- Wool from sheep
- Milk from cows

Know the following meat sources -

- Pork comes from a pig
- Beef comes from a cow
- Lamb comes from a sheep

Know that cows produce milk which is stored in their udders.

Know that in the past farmers milked cows by hand by pulling the udders.

Know that farmers now milk cows using machinery which is faster than doing so by hand.

Know that exotic fruits can be grown on farms in hot countries.

Know that if we want to buy some food it can only come from foreign countries, such as bananas. Know that exotic fruits include pineapples, coconuts, pomegranate, kiwi and mango.

Know what these fruits look and taste like.

Know that we get food from farms all over the world. The food is harvested and then transported in large ships across the world. Know that, in the past, farms were run by many people but now big machines do a lot of the work so fewer farm workers are needed.


Know the following machines used on a farm: Tractor - a farm vehicle that is used to pull farm machinery and to provide the energy needed for the machinery to work. Combine Harvester - a large machine which is used on farms to cut, sort, and clean grain.
Know that fruit farms often employ lots of people when it is harvest time to collect the fruit because machines can damage fruit. Know the names of the following baby animals on the farm - sheep/lamb, cow/calf, duck/duckling, goat/kid, chicken/chick, pig/piglet, horse/foal

Expressive Art and Design	Artist Study - Cezanne Still Life Know that Paul Cezanne is a famous painter from France Know that he died a long time ago but we still look at his paintings because they are so good. Know where France is on a map of Europe compared to the UK Know that Cezanne often painted still life paintings. Know that still life paintings are paintings or drawings of an arrangement of objects such as flowers or fruit. Many artists paint these as they do not move so can be studied carefully to help them draw and paint the objects.

Festivals and Celebrations	 Share and perform the learning that has taken place Easter Know all about The Easter Story Know that Jesus arrived in Jerusalem on Palm Sunday Know that a palm tree has large leaves Know that people were happy to see Jesus and they waved palm branches Know that some important people were jealous of how the people loved Jesus Know that Judas was one of Jesus' special friends called disciples. Know that the important people gave Judas money to tell them where Jesus was so they could arrest him. Know that Jesus had a special dinner called a Passover meal with his friends. This meal is now known as the Last Supper. Know that Leonardo Da Vinci created a famous painting of this scene

Know that Judas told the important people where Jesus was. Jesus was arrested.

Know that Jesus was nailed onto a large wooden cross - this was called the crucifixion

Know that Jesus died on the cross. His family and friends were very sad.

Know that Jesus' body was put into a **tomb**. A large, heavy stone was out in front of the entrance.

Know that a tomb is a large grave that is above ground and that usually has a sculpture or other decoration on it.

Know that on the third day, Mary and some of Jesus' other friends went to the tomb. Jesus' body wasn't there and the stone had been rolled away. An angel told them that Jesus had risen from the dead. Know that this is called the **resurrection** - when Jesus came back to life.

Know that a painter named Raphael was inspired to paint this picture - 'Resurrection of Christ' showing Jesus rising from his tomb. Know that **Christ** is an alternative name for Jesus - the son of God.

Know that Easter is celebrated at the end of March or in April each year

Know that many Christians will celebrate Easter by going to church on Easter Sunday

Know that many Christians and non-Christians will exchange Easter eggs.

Know that eggs symbolise new life, as Jesus began his new life after his resurrection on Easter Sunday.

Know that cracked eggs are **symbolic** of an empty tomb.

Know that a roast lamb is a common meal on Easter Sunday. Know that a lamb is a young sheep.

Mothering Sunday

Know that Mother's Day is celebrated in March each year.

Know that Mother's Day, or Mothering Sunday, is a time when children pay respect to their mothers.

Know that Mother's Day is always on a Sunday

Know that children often give their mothers a gift and a card

Know that Mother's Day is celebrated on different days and for different reasons in many countries around the world but the central idea of **honouring** your mother is **universal**.

St David's Day

Know that St David's Day is celebrated on 1st March each year

Know that it is particularly celebrated in Wales as St David is the patron saint of Wales.

Know and identify Wales on the map of the UK

Know that the UK consists of 4 countries - Scotland, Northern Ireland, Wales and England

Know and recognise the flag of Wales



Know that Saint David spread the word of Christianity throughout Wales

Know that Saint David was famous for the **miracles** he performed. One day, he caused the ground to rise beneath him so everyone could see and hear him.

Know that a miracle is a wonderful and surprising event that is believed to be caused by God.

Know that St David's Day is **commemorated** by the wearing of **daffodils** or **leeks**

Know that on St David's Day, some children wear the national dress of Wales.

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This consists of a tall black hat, white frilled cap and a long dress.

Know that the Welsh community have a **parade** to celebrate.

Know that a parade is a procession of people or vehicles moving through a public place in order to celebrate an important day or event.

St Patrick's Day Know that St Patrick's day in celebrated in Ireland (distinguish between Ireland and Northern Ireland) Know where Ireland is on the world map Dublin Ireland Limerick Know and recognise the flag of Ireland Know that St Patrick's day is celebrated every year on 17th March Know that Saint Patrick is the patron saint of Ireland. Know that he is known for introducing **Christianity** to Ireland. Know that people wear green on St. Patrick's day and some people go to church in the morning. Know that people take part in special parades Know that St. Patrick's day is an Irish national holiday but it is also celebrated in the UK, Canada, Australia and New Zealand Know that leprechauns and shamrocks are all symbols of St. Patrick's Day. Know that a leprechaun is a type of fairy in Irish folklore. They are usually depicted as little bearded men, wearing a coat and hat, who partake in mischief.
