All primary and secondary schools should be able to demonstrate that no form of discrimination is tolerated and that pupils show respect for those who share the protected characteristics.

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| Age | Where this is referred to, it refers to a person belonging to a particular age (for example, 32-year olds) or range of ages (for example, 18- to 30-year olds). | Celebrating Difference Year 6 Piece 3: Power Struggles |

| Being married or in a civil partnership | Marriage is no longer restricted to a union between a man and a woman but now includes a marriage between a same-sex couple. Same-sex couples can also have their relationships legally recognised as 'civil partnerships'. | Being pregnant or on maternity leave | Pregnancy is the condition of being pregnant or expecting a baby. Maternity refers to the period after the birth, and is linked to maternity leave in the employment context. | Disability | A person has a disability if she or he has a physical or mental impairment which has a substantial and long-term adverse effect on that person's ability to carry out normal day-to-day activities. | Celebrating Difference Year 6 Piece 5: Celebrating difference |
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| Race, including colour, nationality, ethnic or national origin | Refers to the protected characteristic of Race. | Religion, belief or lack of religion/belief | Religion has the meaning usually given to it but belief includes religious and philosophical beliefs including lack of belief (such as Atheism).
