- Increase attendance of PP students and ensure it is in line with national

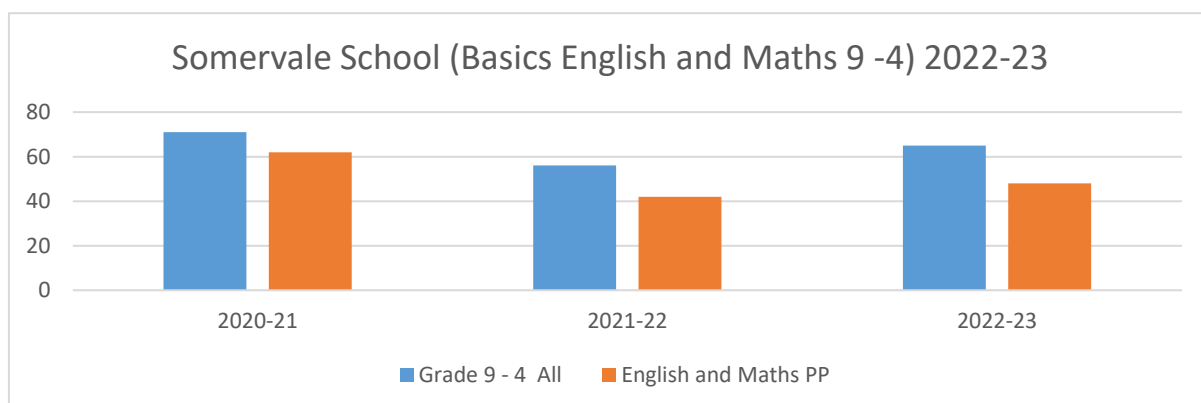
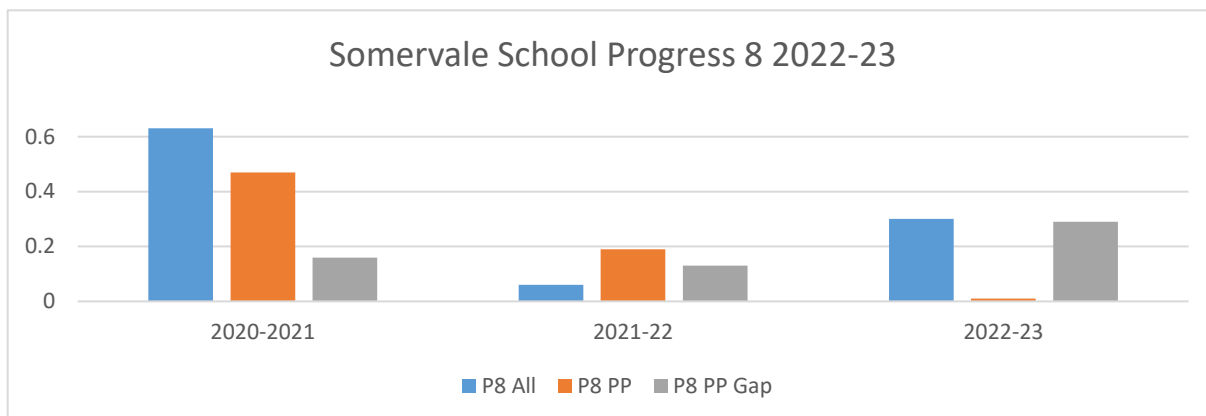
