Message from the Headteacher

As we gear up for another fun and productive term we are quickly finding ourselves fully back in the swing of things after the festive break. Whilst there is still a lot happening, term 3 is a quieter term which means we can focus on some great learning and keeping our expectations high.

Every moment in school counts

In Collective Worship we have talked about setting high expectations for ourselves and of others and how we can take responsibility for being 'ready' for learning. The children suggested that they could help do this by being at school on time in the mornings, and returning to lessons quickly and efficiently after break times. This led us to discussing why attendance in school is so important.

Did you know?

There is a clear link between attendance and attainment; the more time a pupil spends in school the more likely they are to improve their opportunity to fulfil their full potential.

Being on time is a good thing!

It gets the day off to a good start with everyone in a positive frame of mind.

It helps your child make the most of their learning and sets positive patterns for the future.

It helps children develop a sense of responsibility both for themselves and for others

It helps your child make and keep friends.

It improves self confidence.

The impact of being late!

It gets the day off to a bad start and can put you in a mood.

It can be embarrassing.

It may damage your child's confidence.

Children miss vital information at the start of the day.

It disrupts the learning of others.

Being frequently late for school adds up to lost learning

- Arriving 5 minutes late every day adds up to over 3 days lost each year.
- Arriving 15 minutes late every day is the same as being absent for 2 weeks a year.
- Arriving 30 minutes late every day is the same as being absent for 19 days a year.

Some things that may help

Help your child get everything ready the night before (e.g. PE kit, school uniform).

Establish a good bedtime routine and set a reasonable bedtime to ensure everyone gets enough sleep.

Allow plenty of time to get to school.

Make sure your child has breakfast or arrives at school in time for breakfast club.

Help your child organise homework so it is done plenty of time before it is due in school.

If you or your child is finding it challenging getting in to school and on time, please speak to us and we may be able to suggest some practical ways to support you.

Learning in Next Steps Nursery



At Next Steps we have been making the most of the cold weather. With the recent drop in temperature we have noticed lots of changes in the environment - from crunchy leaves, and a 'sparkly' playground to sheets of ice formed in our water tray. The children have been busy exploring the ice outside, and we have even brought some indoors!



We have had fun rescuing arctic animals that have been frozen in blocks of glittery ice, learning about how and why ice melts and breaks. The children have experimented with their warm hands watching as the ice turns into water, and enjoyed investigating how we can make ice in the freezer.








Reading in Year 5
