Reading in Next Steps Nursery



At Next Steps Nursery this week, we have further explored our theme; 'Spring and Growth'.

We have listened to the story 'That's Not a Daffodil' and used it as the basis for lots of learning opportunities. In the story, Mr Yilmaz (who is a keen gardener) gives a bulb to his neighbour, Tom. Tom doesn't believe that a flower will grow from it. He must be patient and attentive to reap the reward of a beautiful, bright daffodil.

The children have looked at the life cycle of a daffodil, ordering the stages and learning new vocabulary such as bulb, stem, bud and roots. They have also looked carefully at some real daffodils, looking at the difference between the closed buds and open flowers. Some children smelt the daffodils and thought that they smelt of peanut butter, bananas and onions!

We have also enjoyed sharing some favourite books from home. The children have been taking turns to bring in special items to give us insight into their hobbies, interests and family life. Lots of children have been sharing special books (especially bedtime stories!). It has been lovely to share them with each other and to listen to some that we haven't ever heard of.



Learning in Year One





In Year One this week, we have been diving into our new English text: 'Grandad's Island'. The story is about a lovely journey Grandad goes on with Syd before staying on the island.

For our experience day we visited Grandad's attic and explored. We made a huge list of all the things we found! It was really exciting to see all of the older items that people might keep in their attic!











DIY Bug Hotel

As part of the Rota Kids Club this term we are looking to expand our school community with some creepy, crawly critters! We will be designing and constructing a bug hotel which will be based on Zone 5 near the forest area. Before we can get started, we need your help!

As a club we are passionate about keeping our environment clean and reducing waste so we are looking for any spare materials you may want to recycle and donate to this wonderful wormy cause.



What we need:

• Dead wood. This is essential for the larvae of wood-boring beetles.

• Hollow stems. Hollow stems, such as old bamboo canes, make good nesting sites for solitary bees.

• Stones and tiles. Amphibians need a frost-free place to spend the winter. Providing stones and tiles in the centre of our habitat will give amphibians the cool, damp conditions they need.

• Straw and hay. These provide many opportunities for invertebrates to burrow

• Corrugated cardboard. Rolled up pieces of corrugated cardboard in a waterproof cylinder creates a home for lacewings.

• **Nectar-producing plants.** Nectar-rich flowers such as Aubretia, Bluebell, Clover, Cuckooflower, Daisy, Dandelion, Forget-me-not, Honesty, Pansy, Primrose, Sweet Rocket and Wallflower provide excellent food for butterflies.
