## Term 1 Attendance Update

As a school we are delighted to highlight the positive start students have made to the new academic year when looking specifically at attendance. It is with great pleasure we are able to share with you that our overall school attendance for Term 1 sits at 94.9%. This is a fantastic achievement, and places us over 2% above National Attendance figures for the same period and consistently within the top 3 across the Trust school for attendance.

Since September students have been holding weekly challenges with themselves and their tutors to improve or maintain high levels of attendance. This has resulted in students and staff discussing the importance of attendance each day. All students are aware of their own attendance, and we are always guick to offer support where barriers to attendance emerge.

Do you know your child's attendance? (This can be found on our Talaxy system)

At Somervale School we strongly believe that good attendance to school is crucial for a student's success. This is a belief that is echoed by both the Trust and the Government and you will be aware is a key focus for all this academic year.

We understand that there can be challenges to ensuring your child attends school regularly, and these challenges may have been intensified by the recent pandemic. However, consistent school attendance is incredibly beneficial for your child's well-being and development. Being in school helps children build strong friendships, enjoy social interactions and engage in a wide range of learning experiences that are crucial for their mental and emotional health as well as has a significant impact on their academic attainment.

During the last week we have seen many students who have been recognised for their excellent and outstanding attendance. We are thrilled to enrol each of these students into our new Somervale Attendance Champions Club, this achievement is gained by students who have an attendance of over 97% at the end of each term. Term 1 saw over 350 enrolled into this.

Well Done to each and every one of them. Students are rewarded with a Certificate and Attendance Badges for each term along with entry into the year group attendance draw.

#### Should I send my child to school?

It is important that if your child is well enough to be in school that they attend each day. However, determining whether or not to send your child to school when they are unwell can be a challenging decision.

Project SEARCH is a one-year supported internship programme for young people who are aged between 16 and 25 with an EHCP. It is a perfect option for those individuals who need some support in 'bridging the gap' between school/college and paid employment, and the programme maintains consistently excellent outcomes in terms of graduates successfully securing and maintaining jobs.





Project SEARCH is a one-year supported internship course for young people with additional needs who want to enter the world of work. The programme was developed in the USA and is now successfully replicated across the globe, with almost 200 of them in the UK. Our Project SEARCH programme is run by Finding Futures, a specialist education provision and part of The Partnership Trust.

Project SEARCH has been a lifechanging experience for me. I changing experience for me. I have achieved a lot and for have considering applying I anyone considering applying I would really recommend it. Would really recommend it. Interns spend the year working in various placements across the Royal United Hospital and the University of Bath, developing a wide variety of employability skills that prepare them for the world of paid work. The programme runs in line with the academic year, with intake being at the beginning of September.

Close support is provided by job coaches who can model tasks, support with social skills and team dynamics, and empower interns with the ability to develop their working independence and resilience. A curriculum is delivered alongside work, including maths, English and employability skills. Interns are also supported with CV development, completing job applications and interview practice.

Our partners, the RUH and UoB, are employers at the forefront of inclusive recruitment and workplace practice. Completing different roles, tasks and working in different environments with different colleagues provides interns with the skills, experience, knowledge and confidence to find and secure paid employment by the end of the year.





Having gained a multitude of transferable skills and experiences across the programme and having developed increased independence, self-confidence and resilience, interns are in a very strong position to secure paid employment by the end of the year. The majority of Project Search graduates are in part or full-time paid employment within 3 months of completing the course, with some achieving that even before the end of the academic year. Taken over the last three years, the average success rate of Project SEARCH graduates securing paid employment upon completion of the programme is close to 90%. #### **Dyslexia Awareness Month is in October**

We often hear about dyslexia in the world around us. But what is it, and how as parents can we support our children?

On the 'Made by Dyslexia' website, it says that:

"Dyslexic brains process information differently. This results in a pattern of strength, like problem solving, creative thinking and seeing the big picture. Plus, challenges like spelling, reading, writing and rote learning."

Knowing how to spot, support and empower dyslexic thinking can transform the life of any dyslexic child.'

## What can parents do to help?

- Don't feel guilty. You did not cause your child to have dyslexia and you could not have prevented it.
- Talk to your child about dyslexia and explain how it may affect the child and what you both can do to overcome it.
- Read **with** your child. Paired reading is a wonderful technique which encourages reading for pleasure and meaning.
- Talk to your child about this and that, everything and anything, just chat. Help with homework by being close at hand to answer questions and to ensure that the child stays on task.
- Keep in touch with the school and keep teachers informed of how things are progressing for the child.
- Using a computer can be a great help to a student with dyslexia. If possible, encourage your child to learn to touch type.

## **Aiming High**




