Dear Parents/Carers

What a fantastic week to finish off a brilliant and jam packed year. As I write this I am currently hiding in my office to rest after spending lunchtime in the hall 'throwing shapes' (yes I am that old...) to Just Dance. Students have had the opportunity to go bowling, swimming, play sports, carry out treasure hunts, go to the beach, create amazing stage makeup and much much more. There are loads of photos later on in the newsletter showcasing our fab week. It has been another fabulous year at Somervale School. It hardly seem like a nearly a year ago when we welcomed 150 Year 7 students through the gates. As I have mentioned previously we have decided to stick to our PAN again for next year and will be opening the doors to summer school on Monday to another 150 (5 tutors groups) students. At present we have decided to keep to the standard size year groups until we can review any additional building we may need. It also allows us to keep the unique feel to the school. We have had four fantastic House Charity weeks which have raised money for a number of charities and in addition to this we raised £450 for Operation Christmas Hamper and over £200 for Christmas Jumper Day. This year we have had a number of reviews by the Trust and they have all been extremely complimentary of the school and the students. It is now widely recognised by all that Somervale continues to be a beacon of exemplary practice. Recently we sent out the link to the parent voice survey to gather your views on the school and I will be reporting back on that in our Term 1 newsletter. The students also completed a student voice survey and their feedback was:

Over 85% of students said they feel happy at the school

Over 90% of students said they feel safe at the school

Over 85% of students feel they are well looked after at the school

Over 89% of students feel they make good progress at the school

Over 90% of students feel they are well taught at the school

Over 80% of students feel they have lots of different opportunities at the school

We are really proud of these results but we recognise that there is always work to be done. The students raised questions about the social zones and in consultation with them we have adjusted these for September. A massive thank you from myself and all the staff at the school for all your support over the last year. It really is a partnership. I would like to wish you all a long, sunny and restful holiday and look forward to seeing all the students in September in their new house ties.

Please ensure that your child is wearing the correct uniform to school. These notes outline what is acceptable. Please speak to the relevant Head of Year if you need further clarification.

Item of Uniform	Acceptable	Not Acceptable	
School sweatshirt	Burgundy V-necked with school logo	Any other type of sweatshirt or hoodie	
White school shirt	Long or short-sleeved with top button.	A polo shirt	
School tie	Clip on House Colour Ties ONLY	Frayed ends or graffiti in any way	
School trousers	Black school trousers	Decorative features such as dangling zips, excessively tight-fitting, jersey of legging material or jean-style trousers (with rivets)	
School skirt	Black, knee-length and pleated	Extreme length, tight or clingy (jersey material) – skirts must be knee-length and NOT ROLLED UP.	
School shoes	Black leather or leather style	No 'trainer style' shoes. Even if sold in the school shoe section of the shop.	
School Socks	Plain black unbranded socks ONLY	Decorative, logo or overly fluffy socks or socks of any other colour than black.	
Coat/Jacket	Appropriate and protective coat (waterproof and warm)	Denim, logo or hooded jackets/sweatshirts and sports style jackets	
Jewellery	Ear studs - One small stud in each ear	Any other, this includes nose studs, eyebrow bars and tongue studs	
Hairstyle	Sensible and appropriate hairstyles	Anything extreme. No hair dye outside of the natural range of colours. No multi-coloured hair or extreme variations in length.	
Make-up <mark>a</mark> nd Nai l s	Neutral coloured make-up and appropriate nail length	Glitter, brightly coloured make-up and anything excessive (e.g. extreme false eyelashes). No nail varnish and extreme lengths that impact on the ability to complete school work and PE lessons safely	
Additional Information	 No hats or scarves to be worn in the buildings Additional layers can be worn under shirts but MUST be in neutral colours and not showing Students are NOT to shave 'slits' into their eyebrows. These MUST be filled in appropriately

All clothing should be clearly marked with the owner's name. This is particularly important as clothing is mislaid, lost and often unclaimed. Advice about clothing or footwear required for certain subjects will be given by the staff concerned.

If students chose to not follow the schools uniform expectations this may result in students going home to get changed, replacement uniform being worn or possibly removed from circulation until the uniform issue is resolved.

In the case of incorrect footwear, students will be required to wear the school's replacement shoes ('daps') unless there is a medical reason.

Students with extreme haircuts or dyes may be sent home to remedy the situation or placed in isolation until the issue is rectified.

Students who wear excess jewellery will have this confiscated and returned following an after school detention. Failure to comply with any of the above may result in suspension.

- Studded Boots* (round, plastic, moulded studs required so can be used on the astroturf and grass)

- Shin Pads
- Towel
- Thermal Long Sleeve Top
- Somervale School Rugby Jersey
- Plain black tracksuit bottoms

All Somervale branded and plain uniform options can be purchased from Norton Sports and Camping, located in the High Street.

^{*}Please note that on the astroturf, metal studs or blades are not permitted. As the surface acts like grass, normal trainers are also not appropriate footwear for the astroturf. Round, moulded, plastic studs are therefore essential.

Astroturf Trainers:

Suitable for the astroturf but <u>not</u> the field. If you already own this type of trainer, you can use it, but only for activities on the astroturf.





Blades:

Suitable for the field but <u>not</u> the astroturf. If you already own this type of boot, you can use it, but only for activities on the grass.

Suitable for the field and astroTurf.



The award ceremony was attended by MNSP students, library staff, CEO Alan Williams and Frome College headteacher, Emma Reynolds, with local author Matt Dickinson and shortlisted authors, Catherine Bruton, Keith Gray, Fleur Hitchcock, Elle McNicoll attending as VIP guests. Nora Dasnes joined the ceremony by video link, live from Norway.

The winning author, Catherine Bruton, tearfully thanked the students for "choosing my book as your winner" and praised the other shortlisted books and authors, saying "I really didn't expect this - I didn't prepare a speech, because the other books are all so good!"

why their chosen book should win.









Developing Confidence In Public Speaking

We kickstarted the term with an inspirational talk by Susannah Streeter and Victoria Bartlett from Speakers for Schools. Both Susannah and Victoria have an extensive career in the media both in front of the camera (Susannah) and behind it (Victoria). They have worked on radio and television - including BBC and ITV - travelled around the world, and met an impressive number of famous people.

Emma Yates, Deputy CEO of the MNSP Trust, opened the event by introducing the subject of confidence, opportunities, and success. Her words set the tone for Victoria and Susannah's talk, and reinforced the importance of having high aspirations.

Susannah and Victoria's talk on developing confidence in public speaking inspired some of our girls in Year 9 and Year 10 to seek more opportunities to use their voices and express their views.

Our students received practical advice from body posture, and what to wear, to how to prepare for difficult meetings and interviews.

The girls were impressed with some of the personal stories shared by Susannah and Victoria: similarly to Mrs Yates, they both carved successful careers in quite a competitive industry showing that one can build confidence and learn how to speak in public even if it may seem daunting at first.

We would like to thank Susannah, Victoria, and Mrs Yates for their time and inspiration.



Careers

On the 2nd July, the whole Somervale School community celebrated all things careers. All students were able to engage with employers, such as Tesco, AirBus, KPMG, RAF, Army, as well as smaller businesses, which included idverde and the Roman Baths. 


